### **ECCO Garden Tour and Yogurt**

Visit some of the incredible gardens here in the East Campus neighborhood and help ECCO raise money to “re-tree” our neighborhood. A small fee will be charged for the tour. *More details of our garden tour yet to come, but for now be sure to save the date!*

### **Re-Tree Nebraska and fund-raising**

Re-Tree Nebraska is a 10-year cooperative initiative to raise public awareness of the value of trees and reverse the decline of Nebraska’s community trees and forests. ECCO has received a grant to offset the original loss to our canopy due to Dutch Elm disease in 1973; and to get ahead of the expected losses due to the Emerald Ash borer. It is estimated that 1/3 of the trees in Lincoln are Ash, and we know we have many in ECCO.

We must raise half the funds (\$2,700) in order to receive the matching amount of \$2,700 from Re-Tree Nebraska for a total of \$5,400 dedicated to planting trees in our neighborhood this fall. We are hosting a fundraising event to benefit this worthy cause – a walking tour of ECCO gardens on Saturday June 1<sup>st</sup> from 9am – 1pm.

If you stop in at **Yogurtini** at 233 North 48<sup>th</sup> Street (north of Target) on June 1<sup>st</sup> and tell them you are from ECCO, the neighborhood will make even more money!



## **LPS Early Childhood Program open**

It’s that time of year again! LPS Early Childhood Program (E<sup>x</sup>CITE) will begin accepting applications for the 2013-2014 school year beginning on March 1, 2013. Parents will be able to apply at our district office located at 949 W. Bond St. as well as at their local elementary school. In order to apply for a child who is 3 or 4 before July 31, 2013, you will need to fill out the two page application and supply LPS Early Childhood Program (E<sup>x</sup>CITE) staff with your child’s certified birth certificate, immunization records, and 2012 income verification.

If you have already applied for the program and your child is on the waiting list you will need to come in and update your current application and provide LPS Early Childhood Program (E<sup>x</sup>CITE) staff with your 2012 income verification. ## Kudos to Paul and Sherri Johnson

On March 3, 2013 the *Preservation of Lincoln Association* presented the 2013 Residential Award to Paul and Sherri Johnson for their renovation of the house at 4027 Holdrege Street.

When the Johnsons purchased the property in December of 2009, one of their main goals was to prevent the lot from becoming a parking lot for the next door fraternity and preserve their neighborhood. The 1918 vintage house was so run down that it was close to being demolished and turned into a parking lot. There was extensive water damage inside and holes in the soffits on the outside allowing animals free access to the interior.

It took two years for Johnsons, who did much of the work themselves, to transform the house from a “money pit” into The Johnson Guest House. Contactors replaced electrical, plumbing, heating and air conditioning systems inside. Outside, overgrown bushes and over 20 trees were removed and the yard re-graded. Utilizing a cooperative program with the City of Lincoln, a rain garden was included with the new landscaping.
