Some of the biggest changes we are seeing in our neighborhood are on Idylwild Drive. At one time there was a horse stable on Idylwild Drive, then came Val and Zena Weiler's Campus Fruit Market. In 1957, the Weilers changed the market into a pizza parlor and named it Valentino's. Tony and Ron Messineo purchased the restaurant in 1972, but did not change its name. Mike Alesio joined the Messineos in operating Val's in 1973.

Soon the current Valentino's building will be torn down. For many, the neighborhood will never be quite the same without that yellow building with roses out front and the smell of baking pizza crust in the air. But there will be a new Valentino's Trattoria restaurant and, thanks to the a donation of \$135,000 from Valentino's, a revitalized park and boulevard on Idylwild Drive.

This year ECCO's annual meeting will focus on celebrating both the old and the new neighborhood life on Idylwild Drive. Thanks to the generosity of Valentino's, this year's ECCO annual meeting and dinner will be held at and hosted by Valentino's Restaurant on 35th and Holdrege.

Following dinner, we will hold a brief business meeting. Then the fun will begin with a look back at the **history of Valentino's**, starting with a talk by Lincoln's historian *Ed Zimmer*. *Tony Messineo* and *Mike Alesio* will tell us more about

Valentino's history in the neighborhood. Then *we want to hear from you*. Please come with your stories about memorable visits to Valentino's or the role Val's has played in your life. (One minute only please.)

Following our reminiscing, we will look to the future with a peek at the **plans for the new Valentino's Trattoria**. ### **Review of 2013**

### Garden Workshops and Tour

Danielle Shea organized our second Discover ECCO event - a garden tour of seven of the many wonderful gardens in our neighborhood. Over 200 people attended the event, which kept the 22 volunteers helping with the tour very busy. Danielle and her committee also arranged for four very helpful gardening workshops attended by more than 50 people. Many of the rain barrels that now dot the neighborhood were the result of one of the workshops.

### Saving the Catalpa Tree

Talking about gardens, Richard Sutton, always on the alert to preserve trees in the neighborhood, noticed a large catalpa tree and several other trees on the Valentino's redevelopment block were targeted for removal. A series of phone calls to the city from Richard, ECCO, and Tony Messineo saved the trees.

### **Planting More Trees**

### Neighborhood Cleanup and July 4th Parade

Patti Pearson organized the annual ECCO cleanup and Tom Madsen with the help of Bob Peterson and others put together a really fun Fourth of July Parade. This year we had some old fashioned games instead of a talent show. The games seemed to be a hit.

### Stop light at 33<sup>rd</sup> and the MoPac

After a child was hit crossing  $33^{rd}$  Street near Peter Pan Park and the MoPac Trail, ECCO along with the Great Plains Trails Network successfully lobbied the city to commit to putting a stop light that will flash when someone approaches the street where the MoPac trail crosses  $33^{rd}$  Street.

### **Idylwild Park**

It was Brian Striman, our hard working webmaster, who developed a questionnaire to solicit opinions about how to redevelop Idylwild Park. With his help and the willingness of the city Parks and Recreation staff to work with us, ECCO was able to develop a park plan will provide a beautiful and unique park that will meet the needs of the neighborhood residents. The plans for the park will be unveiled at ECCO's annual meeting.

### Re-treeing: The Trees are Here!

On Sunday October 6, ECCO volunteers planted 38 trees throughout the neighborhood, in an effort to replace the canopy of "street trees" in areas that would benefit most. The project began nearly a year ago, with a submission spearheaded by Roy Maurer to *Re-Tree Nebraska* for a matching fund grant for \$2,700. The grant was approved, and the real work began! Board member Danielle Shea kicked off the project by coordinating four gardening classes during the spring. On June 1, seven ECCO neighbors opened their beautiful gardens for more than 200 people to tour. The tour raised the needed \$2,700 to match the grant, totaling \$5,400.

ECCO volunteers Richard and Lisa Sutton developed a street-by-street review for placement of the trees, dividing the neighborhood into quadrants, so that all areas would receive an equal number of trees. Homeowners were contacted, with help from Mary Eisenhart, T. J. Fontaine, and Richard and Lisa followed up by staking out the sites where trees were to be placed. Roy Maurer worked countless hours coordinating with the City and contacting "Digger Hotline"! The planting crews arrived with spades in hand, dug holes and placed the trees. Volunteers included members of Farmhouse fraternity. The trees will be watered and cared for by property owners and tenants.

This was a project that truly shows that "many hands make light work". It could not have been completed without great support from ECCO Board members, neighbors, and volunteers. Thanks to all involved in making our ECCO neighborhood more beautiful for years to come – truly a benefit for us all!
