Bad Things Can Happen in Good Places | Lincoln Police Department

The East Campus area is a wonderful neighborhood in a very safe city, but it is a mistake to fail to take steps to enhance your personal safety and to protect your belongings and your loved ones. Every city the size of Lincoln experiences crime, and people that live in the East Campus area do occasionally fall victim to crime.

Recently, a woman was sexually assaulted in her home near 43rd and Baldwin by a suspect that entered • through a window. This is a rare occurrence in Lincoln, but a sobering reminder that there are things we all must consistently do to help prevent becoming a victim of crime.

- Lock doors and windows of cars and your home. Make sure the garage door is shut and secured after dark, unless you are working in it.
- Don't leave any valuables or keys in your car. A thief will window shop and check door handles. Unless you always park in a garage, I guarantee that someone has checked your car out at some point. Many of you have probably experienced the uneasy feeling that someone was in your car rummaging through it, looking for something worth

stealing.



• Be aware of your surroundings. This means if someone you don't know is in your surroundings, pay attention to their behavior and act in ways that increase safety. Undoubtedly, the vast

majority of people are just like you and pose no threat whatsoever, but there are enough criminals that you don't want to play the odds and assume you are always safe. Pay attention to your instincts and act in ways that put safety first when your instincts are telling you something. That being said, threats to your safety come in all sizes, shapes, and colors and it is wrong to assume someone of a particular race or demographic is more, or less, of a potential threat to your safety.

- People that spend a little time thinking about what to do if a bad situation develops, or better yet practicing what they would do, are far more likely to act effectively if that bad situation happens.
- Doing simple things like this needs to be a habit. If it is a habit, it always gets done and you don't have to think about it. If you don't think about it, you're not living in fear, you're just taking reasonable steps to ensure safety. With that, I'll leave you with the words that we often use to send officers out on patrol—*Stay safe!*
